Developmental Services Ontario

Developmental Services Ontario (DSO) is the single point of access and primary contact point for information about Ministry-funded adult developmental services and supports in Ontario

There are nine offices located across the province.

What are the Functions of the DSO

- Confirm eligibility for those applying for services and supports for the first time
- Complete the DSO Application Package to better understand an individual's service and support needs
- Provide information about and link people to MCCSS-funded services and supports, when they are available
- Provide information about alternative services and non-Ministry funded supports that are available in the individual's area

2017-2018 Initial MCCSS investment in Housing Navigation

2018-2021 one (1) DSO HN serving Toronto Region 2021 Discussions with MCCSS and DSOs re: Expanding HN services

2021 Criteria for HN expansion finalized

2022 One year expansion of Toronto HN team with a focus on three (3) cohorts, in addition to original scope

Role of the DSO Housing Navigator AFTER the One (1) Year Expansion

The expansion of DSO housing navigation is confirmed until March 31, 2023

If the expansion concludes and one (1) Housing Navigator remains, DSO Toronto anticipates that housing navigation duties will continue much as they did prior to the expansion. Individuals, caregivers, and agency representatives will be encouraged to continue to make use of housing navigation resources and consultation services.

Housing Navigation at the DSO

Provides individuals and those supporting them with information and resources needed to create person-centred housing and support plans

Advocates for the housing needs and inclusion of adults with a developmental disability

Creates and shares tools and resources





Developmental Sector Housing Stats

Eligible Individuals who are actively waiting for service of any kind (e.g. Community Participation Supports, Supportive Living, Person Directed Planning, Case Management, etc.) in Toronto: approximately 11,000

Individuals Actively Receiving Supportive Living Service: 1,861

*Unique Individuals Waiting for Supportive Living (of any kind): 4,825

Disclaimer:

These numbers are always fluctuating, and **this represents a capture in time from March 31, 2022** *These individuals have varied needs and are waiting for services that range from supportive independent living (lower support needs) to intensive support services (highest support needs).

Housing Navigation Role

Providing resources to agency staff, individuals, their caregivers and informal support teams:

- Consultations
- Webinars
- Sharing existing resources and creating new resources

Support to explore and connect to housing options outside of the developmental service sector

Facilitating connections to family support networks and/or where possible, connections to potential planning partners or roommates



Housing Navigation Role

Advocacy for the needs of people with Developmental Disabilities within the Housing Sector and Municipality

Work to strengthen existing pathways and forge new connections to support the needs of adults with a developmental disability

- education
- child welfare
- transitional-aged services
- shelter system



Housing Navigation Does Not Include:

- Providing or securing housing
- Providing funding
- Case management or service coordination
- Step by step planning assistance for the creation of individualized housing and support plans
- Emergency or crisis support services

Social Housing

(Also known as: Rent-Geared-to-Income or Subsidized Housing)

Rent-Geared-to-Income (RGI), or subsidized housing, is made available by the City of Toronto to make rent affordable for households. In most cases, the rent for a subsidized unit is 30 per cent of a household's total monthly income. If you receive social assistance the rent is based on the rent benefit set by the Ontario government.



Affordable Rental **Housing Program**

As of July 2021, there are 105 active affordable rental housing projects in the development pipeline in Toronto - which is expected to provide approximately 10, 400 homes:

- 31 active developments are under construction - which are expected to provide 3,200 affordable rental and supportive homes
- 74 projects are in pre-construction which are expected to provide 7,200 affordable rental and supportive homes

Free Virtual Workshop Series


This three (3) session workshop series is designed to help you begin creating an individualized housing and support plan for you or a family member with a developmental disability.
