WHAT MAKES IT MEANINGFUL

A time capsule preserves personal memories, mementos, and reflections to be opened in the future—promoting self-awareness, emotional reflection, and a sense of growth over time

TIME

- 30–45 minutes to select and assemble items
- Optional prep time if you fill printable "All About Me" sheets ahead
- Long-term storage: open in 1, 5, 10, or any amount of years, depending on choice

MATERIALS

- A **container** (e.g., decorate a shoebox, use a cylinder chip tub, mason jar, envelope pocket)
- Printable "All About Me" sheets or questionnaires (favorite food, height, friends, hopes, etc.)
- Keepsakes: small toys, drawings, photographs, ribbon with height, letters to future self, ticket stubs, etc
- Writing and decorating supplies: markers, stickers, glue
- Tape or seal for closing the capsule
- Optional: envelope/folder for paper slips/letters

Make a Time Capsule!

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Create or decorate the capsule

Choose a container and personalize it with names, dates, or images.

2. Fill out "All About Me" pages

o Include facts, favorites, dreams, and a letter to your future self on printable sheets

3. Select mementos to include

 Photos, a small drawing, a favorite small toy, a ribbon or token representing height/memory, or other symbols of today

4. Pack the items inside

 Place written sheets and keepsakes inside the container. Ensure everything is safely enclosed.

5. Seal and label the capsule

 Write who created it, the date of creation, and a future opening date (e.g. "Open June 2030").

6. Store safely

 Keep in a dry, safe place indoors—or bury in a weather-resistant container with a clear marker

7. Plan a reopening

 Choose when you'll open it—after one year, at a milestone age, or at a future date—then enjoy reminiscing later.

SUPPORTS NEEDED

- Visual checklist showing steps: decorate → fill sheets → add items → seal → store
- Simplified sheets with large fonts or picture cues
- One-on-one assistance for writing, cutting, or sealing
- Pre-prepared kits with sample keepsakes and prompts
- Verbal prompts/dialogue questions: "What's your favorite song?" "Draw a picture of today."
- Sensory supports: gloves for handwriting or materials if textures are bothersome
- Emotional framing: celebrate the act of recording your story
- Safety guidance: careful with scissors, ensure container lid is secure
